WILDFIRE CRISIS


Through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Congress appropriated \$1.4 billion to start putting our Wildfire Crisis Strategy into action with investments on 10 landscapes in 8 Western States. Through work on these landscapes, as well as ongoing Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program, Joint Chiefs' Landscape Restoration Partnership, and regularly appropriated hazardous fuels reduction projects, we completed treatments on 3.2 million acres.

With additional funding under the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, we selected 11 more landscapes in 69 of the 250 firesheds identified in the Wildfire Crisis Strategy that are in need of immediate work.

We listened to our employees, our partners, and Tribes on what mattered most to them, where opportunity exists, and where challenges remain. Their feedback and our experience on these landscapes helped us identify both challenges to implementation and conditions that can lead to future success.
